This claim is invalid, and can be debunked with a series of objections to this deranged, and unrealistic goal that some people desire today. Defunding the police will defeat current police officers morale, increase overall crime rate, and enable criminals to cause chaos, because there will be no restrainment in order.

Choosing law enforcement as a vocation is a career that takes much courage and bravery. For many officers, this choice is made out of intentions to create law and order in today's society, and ensure safety for each and every citizen. Somehow, the police narrative has changed from someone people go to for help, on possibly the worst day of their lives, to the aggressor, someone who causes this violence and suffering. There is a dire need for police everywhere, and without them, there will be absolute chaos throughout America. The National Police Support Fund States, "Police officers around the country keep us safe from drugs, violence, gangs, domestic abuse, and myriad other threats to the American way of life. No other branch of government or social service agency can do the job in quite the same way"(NPSF). If police are not implementing this job, who will enforce the laws that keep citizens safe? The answer is no one, considering the harsh training these individuals endure.

Not only will defunding the police greatly reduce officers keeping our cities safe, but the officers that DO still police, will not perform their jobs as efficiently. This roots out of fear for themselves and their families, no one that devotes this much time to better society wants to be constantly victimized for doing their job correctly. Nevertheless, instead of supporting the people that are their for them it desperate measures, society paints them as evil, and even refers to them as terrorists. As stated in Demonizing and Defunding the Polices has Consequences, "Resources and equipment can be built back up again, but it's a lot harder to replace good, seasoned officers – particularly right now, when it's difficult to imagine why anyone would want to become a police officer. Why would men and women sign up for a job where they are regularly characterized as the worst kind of criminals?" (Thune).

Following this last generation of cops, society will be left with no individuals willing to take on this vocation, and there will be no laws or regulations in place to ensure safety within. Candidates worthy enough of taking on this career are being torn down to the point where their overall mental state, and well being is at stake. Mental health is one issue that activists for defunding the police tend to speak up about. So why is it that the mental health of men and women who are first responders does not matter?

Additionally, a number of people within the democratic party advocate for a variety of societal issues they want to alter. For example, LGBTQ rights, climate change, and gun laws. These people plea for nothing but enforcement of these changes, but then continuously degrade the work of men and women in the police force. Ben Shapiro, a conservative activist makes an intelligible point in one of his podcasts called Daily Wire, "They want heavy regulations on virtually every area of life but they refuse to acknowledge the reality of regulations" (Shapiro). These people are blind to the fact that enforcing regulations is exactly what law enforcement does. A regulation sets a structure that society has to abide by.

Various leftist activists' dominant focus most recently is restricting use of guns, and several leftists even want to completely abolish gun use. This can lead to the question of self defense. If police are caught in a situation with an armed offender, how will the police tame him/her without this defense? This community is under the impression that defunding the police, and moving funds towards other civil projects will be more beneficial, while not considering the extenuous amount of consequences this action will result in, such as the crime rate spike. Referring back to the article, Demonizing and Defunding the Polices has Consequences, it states, "Crime rates have surged since "defund the police" became a rallying cry. It's no coincidence that cities that have slashed their police budgets have seen huge increases in violence. As of the end of May, Portland, Oregon, was on track to exceed 1,000 shootings for this year. In the first 14 weeks of 2021, New York City shootings were up 81 percent. In Oakland, California, carjackings are up almost 88 percent" (Thune). This evidence advances from current South Dakota's Senator, John Thune. Elected officials approximating to him, are bringing this issue up to the public, and addressing the situation and its possible consequences on American cities everywhere. Following the black lives matter protests, the topic of defunding the police was put into action in some areas. When this took place, there were instantly surges in crime rates not only in California, but across the country.

Criminals tend to be people that have suffered some type of trauma in their life, or suffer with a mental illness that makes them act out of context. In America, and everywhere on the earth for that matter, there are bad people, this is known. There are murderers, rapists, burglars, carjackers, kidnappers, hijackers, and a list of many more. This is a sad reality, but this is a reality that the world must face to endure, and make their lives safe and content. If someone commits a crime, and harms another individual, a police officer is responsible to do what it takes to prevent, restrain, and in most cases serve justice to the victim. 

Everybody wants to fit in; from being with friends, family, and peers, the feeling of belonging is something that is craved. In China, the CCP (Communist China Party) is trying to demolish Muslim customs, and they are doing this by putting the people into camps to train them to be more "Chinese like. Around the world, nothing is being done to stop this genocide, but why? The news isn't covering it, it is not being taught, and everything around the mistreatment of these people is being silenced. Almost like the Chinese know that they are doing something wrong. Knowing this and still proceeding to not do anything, The United States needs to take charge and help the ethnic Muslims in China, as the effects, not only in China, but also worldwide, are detrimental to the Islamic population.

China has an established Communist government. This means that the leaders are very focused on having the Chinese government be the means of power and of the highest importance, not religion. China is often considered to be "a culturally homogeneous nation-state composed solely of the Han-Chinese ethnic majority," (Ciara 4). This is where the issue between Muslims and the Chinese takes place. In the Islamic religion, Muslims believe in Allah, an all-knowing god whom the people have to live in submission to. The CCP does not like this, and therefore wants to change the way that the Uyghurs are living. "The Uyghurs' language, religion, and even physical appearance, in the eyes of the government, distinguish them from the Chinese population and connect them to neighboring populations in Central Asia and co-religionists around the world" (Omer Kanat). Omer Kanat not only expresses the Chinese' way of thinking, but also their insecurities about having people even slightly different in their population. From religion to looks and everything in between, it is all seen as illicit and not allowed in China.

Muslim Destruction

Due to the ideology of the Chinese government, Muslims are being thrown into "reteaching" camps, and are being enforced into Chinese customs. Muslims are experiencing forced assimilation from the government and its workers. Inside concentration camps, prisoners are "forced to renounce Islam, criticize their own Islamic beliefs and those of fellow inmates, and recite Communist Party propaganda songs for hours each day" (Rushan Abbas). When forcing the Muslims to recite Communist songs and live Communist lifestyles, it is knowingly brainwashing the Uyghurs to change their customs and to learn nothing else except what the government wants them to know. Human abuses are also going on in the camps, which include many forms of torture, sterilizations, severe brainwashing, forced labor, and many more. Some of the forms of torture going on inside of the intermittent camps consists of people being drugged, electrical induced pain, wearing iron suits, waterboarding, medical experiments, and sexual torture. Rape and sexual torture are also very common. This includes gang rape, women having their genitals rubbed with chili paste, public humiliation, and electrical vaginal shocking. This alone should receive national attention, yet no one has heard anything about it. While this is going on, people are also being forced to pick cotton, work in factories, and get sterilized by tubal ligation. Multiple people have come forward about the abuses that they and their loved ones have suffered, but every time they do this, the Chinese government dismisses it and denies it to the public. Even with the officials denying these statements, people within the Islam religion know it is true and are trying to do something about it as quickly as possible.

While not every Muslim is not in a camp, abuses are still happening outside of them as well. Some abuses included are cohabitation, rape, abortion, organ harvesting, and forced labor. Government workers in China are forcefully inhabiting Uyghur citizens' homes to make sure that they are not continuing to practice their religion. The close speciation of the people enforces a complete cultural ablation. People in the government got away with this by claiming that they were relatives to the people's houses that they were moving into. Human Rights Watch has condemned the assimilation program in China as deeply forced. Women in China are also being forced to have abortions, especially when getting pregnant due to Chinese government workers' rape, and among with this, organ harvesting in China has become extremely prevalent. The Chinese are using the internment camps to recover organs to then sell on the black market. Fast lanes were even created for the organs to have a fast way to get to the airport and then exported. Uyghurs are used to working in sweatshops outside of the camps. These shops are being used in the hope to reduce Uyghur population density, and the goal of demolition of³⁴ Islam is being reached.

Muslim Destruction

Foreign fear and opinion on the genocide have extremely low value to China and are only somewhat recognized when China is in favor of a country's statements and actions. China's robust surveillance system extends overseas, with a special emphasis placed on monitoring the Uyghur treatment and way of life around the world. China's hacking of Uyghurs is so aggressive that it is effectively global, extending far beyond China's borders. Uyghurs in the United Arab Emirates, Egypt, and Saudi Arabia have been detained and deported back to China. Rights activists fear that even as Western nations are creating movements to protest the treatment of Uyghurs, countries in the Middle East and beyond will increasingly be willing to move past the crackdown on members of the abusers. Around the globe, close to nothing is being done to counteract these forms of genocide against humanity, but why? The Human Rights Council condemned China's mass detention of Uyghurs, but fifty other countries supported China. The countries that disagree argue that diplomats who have traveled to China have not seen these abuses being carried out, and that essentially the media and people in it are lying. China has continued to deny any abuses being carried out, but then the UN (United Nations) decided that they needed to take a fact-finding trip to see what was happening, and when they went, thirty-nine countries left their side of support. Since then, China has denied all access for visitation from anyone from the UN or another county, and people who do visit China usually have to sign a document or swear that they will not produce any articles or statements pertaining to the treatment of Uyghurs in China. European nations have also been banned from visiting China. Currently, China has a man detained named Ilham Tohti, just because he was elected for the Sakharov Prize for Freedom and Thought. European countries have also induced travel bans and asset freezes because of the abuses. In 2020, the United States Congress passed the Uyghur Human Rights Policy Act in reaction to the internment camps, and lawmakers proposed the Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act requiring the assumption that all Xinjiang goods are made with forced labor and therefore banned. Imports have also been blocked, and the United States government was the first to declare that what is happening in China is genocide. Even with the imports being blocked, the U.S. relies on these camps to produce goods, so how can the government truly cut the importation of goods that Americans need? Small progress has been demonstrated in helping the Muslims, but more can be done.






